OUR APPROACH

The Jackie Robinson Foundation (JRF) was founded in 1973 to address the achievement gap in higher education. Our celebrated scholarship program provides generous, four-year grants and comprehensive support services to highly motivated students of color with strong capabilities but limited resources. JRF's scholarship program is known for the depth of its mentoring curriculum, *42 Strategies for Success in College*.

THE RACHEL ROBINSON INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIP

Since 2007, the Rachel Robinson International Fellowship (RRIF) has provided access and financial support for select JRF Scholars to participate in international work-study and community service, commensurate with JRF's curriculum that addresses the global workforce. In 2017, JRF added to the RRIF program a two-week annual service trip to Africa for each rising sophomore class to ensure that an international experience is part of each JRF Scholar's college experience.

In the summer of 2019, JRF's Class of 2022 traveled to Longido, Tanzania, where they participated in the construction of an elementary school and immersed themselves in this rich east African culture.

EXTRA INNINGS FELLOWSHIP

The Jackie Robinson Foundation's (JRF) Extra Innings Fellowship Program ("Extra Innings") was established in 2006 to help JRF Alumni overcome one of the biggest challenges of their career—the cost of an advanced professional or graduate degree. Extra Innings Fellows have pursued graduate degrees in a variety of subjects and have attended a range of institutions, including the Ivy League, public and private colleges and universities, Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), and religious schools. Participants have embarked upon diverse career paths, from physicians, researchers and educators to legal professionals and business executives. The program awards financial grants of up to \$10,000 per year for a minimum of two years, with an average annual grant of \$7,400.

Since its inception, JRF has awarded \$1.85 million to 120 Extra Innings Fellows.


The Jackie Robinson Museum's National Legacy Campaign has raised **\$32.8 million** against a total campaign goal of **\$42 million**.


